Brief Description

Winston-Salem State University is a comprehensive institution offering degree programs at the baccalaureate and master's levels. Its instructional programs are in five academic college/schools and life-long learning. The University offers master's programs in physical therapy, elementary education, occupational therapy, nursing, business administration, computer science, and rehabilitation counseling. A graduate center provides master's level study in a cooperative, interinstitutional arrangement. Commitment to equality of opportunity and racial integration is exhibited through the active recruitment and enrollment of a greater number of students from differing racial backgrounds.

History

Founded in 1892, chartered by the state in 1897 as the Slater Industrial and State Normal School. Renamed Winston-Salem Teachers College in 1925 and became first black institution in the United States to grant degrees in elementary teacher education. Name changed to Winston-Salem State University in 1969. Merged into the University of North Carolina in 1972.

Location

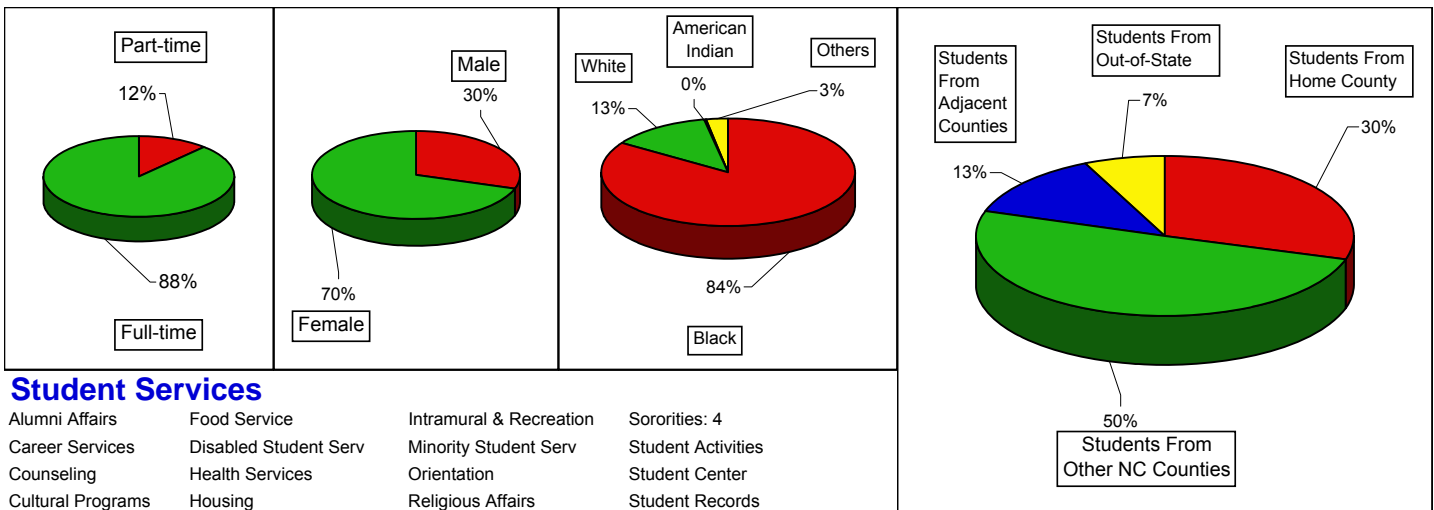
Winston-Salem (population: 200,000), a medical and financial services city, recognized nationally as a cultural center.

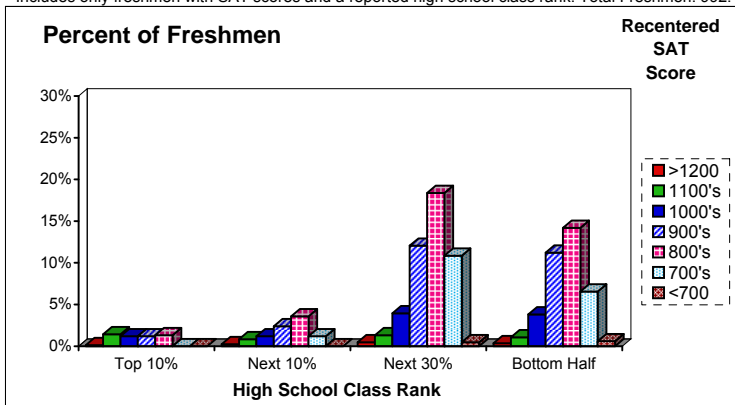
